Tentative Visit of the President to Massens, New York, in June 1959.

On Sunday and Monday, November 9 and 20, the undersigned and SAIC Daley, office $1-1 \mathrm{~h}$, met in Massena, New York, ud th representatives of both the Anerioan and Canadian Governments and discussed the tentative visit of the President and First Lady to Massena in June of 1959, where the President and Queen E1izabeth vill offlcially open the St. Laurence Seavay.

Representing the Anerican Goveriment at these meetings were the follouding: Mr. Levis Castie, Adrinistrator, St. Lavrence Seavay Developnent Corporationg Mr. Ed Place, Infonnation Offlicer, St. Lavence Seavay Development Corporationj Mr. Nayne Hawks, representing Press Seoretary Hagerty of the White Houses Mr. Clement Conger, Assistant Chief of Protocol, U. S. State Department; Mr. Bradloy Fish, Chief of Fleld Offlces, U. S. Commeroe Departments Mr. Kenneth Byrns, Canadian Desk, U. S. State Department; Mr. Luther Cliffe, Resident Engineer, St. Lanrence Project, Hew Yort Pover Authority! Mr. Ed Barlow, Chief Operation Division, St. Lawrence Seavay Development Corporation; Mr. Harry Shriver, General Counsel, St. Lawrence Seavay Development Corporation; Mr. Reece Harrill, Assistant to the Adninistrator, St. Lpmrence Seavay Development Corporation; and Mr. Dell Carlson, of the U. S. Bubassy in Ottava.

Representing the Canadian Government were the folloving: Mr. Harrison Cleveland, Anerican Desk, Department of External Affairs; Mr. T. D. Hayes, Protocol, Department of External Affairas Mr. B. J. Roberts, President, St. Lanmence Seaway Authority; Mr. J. C. Lessard, Vice President, St. Lamrence Seanay Authority; Commodore A. J. Boulton, Canadian Mavys Lt. Comtander F. N. King, Canadian Mavy, Mr. D. E. MolKnnon, Assistant Comissioner, Royal Canadian Mounted Pollce.

The date for this oerenony which seened to be accoptable to Mr. Cleveland, who was the spokesman for the Ganadian group, Mr. Conger, and Mr. Castle was Saturday, June 27, 1959.

The follouing plans vere suggested by the Canadian group and are listed in what seemed to be the order desired by the Canadianss

1. The President and First Lady would join the queen and Prince Philip on the morning of Friday, June 26 in Montreal and would be present at a ceremony in which the Queen would dedicate St. Lambert's Lock near Montreal in the afternoon of Friday, June 26. The President and First Lady would apend the night aboard the Queen's yacht, Britannia, which would anchor overnight in the Beauharnois. The Britannia would lift anchor at approximately 9:00 a. $\mathrm{ml}_{\text {, }}$, on Saturday, June 27 and would cruise up the St. Lavrenoe, arriving at the

Elsenhower Look at approxdmately 2,00 p.m.
2. The President and First Lady would board the Britannia in the Beauhamois at approximately $8: 45$ a.m. on Saturday, June 27 and would cruise up the St. Lavrence, arriving at the Eisenhower Lock at approximately $2: 00$ p. . .
3. The Initial meeting of the President and First Lady and Queen Flizabeth and Prince Philip would take place in the vicinity of the Cormall-Massena High Level Bridge. This plan is very impractical, whether the meeting actually took place on the bridge itself or on the Britannia underneath the bridge, and was fromed upon by the majority of those present at the meetings.
L. The President and First Lady would join the queen and Prince Philip aboard the Britannia at the Snell Look and would oruise to the Eisenhower Look, where the ceremony would take place. This plan is practioally the same as the plans suggested by Mr. Conger and Mr. Castie.
5. The President and Firat Lady would join the Queen and Prince Philip aboard the Britannia at the Snell Lock and would cruise to the Bisenhover Look, where the ceremony would take place and then vould reboard the Britannia and cruise to the Iroquois Lock, where the President and Mre. Eisonhover would take their leave.

The two plans suggested by Mr. Conger and Mr. Castle, both practically alike by (1) starting at approximately 11,00 acm. and the other at approxdmately $2: 30 \mathrm{pom}$. are Listed below
